 $B-24 \ \# \ 825 \ was \ B-24H \ (NITE) - 20 \ FO \ 42-94825 \ "S" in 856th BS. It was originally assigned to 489th BG at Halesworth where it was in 847th BS as S4 S- and named MALFUNCTION JUNCTION. It was flown to Valley on 9 Jul 45 and thence back to the ZI by a crew piloted by Lt (?) Hanf.$ 

The information about our old friend THE RED BALL EXPRESS (42-40992) confirms that it was nearing the end of its days. It had been under ATC orders on 7 Apr 45 when I seem to recall it flew out to the 14th AF in India & the Far East

If Don Heran is still alive, is there any way of asking him whether 42-94825 was still named MALFUNCTION JUNCTION when he and his crew flew it?

42-40362 F in 856th 42-40992 I in 856th named THE RED BALL EXPRESS (apparently only on the port side because this is the plane on the dust cover of Ben Parnell's book and there is neither name nor nose art on the starboard side).

Source of this info: 492nd BG (H) Monthly Inventory Reports of Aircraft for 6 Apr and 6 May 45, both of which include the two aircraft in Part II (on hand at Station service unit). My database shows that the two aircraft were transferred to ATC on 7 Apr 45 (the day after the first of the two inventory reports). This would be in keeping with a flight to another theatre although Ben Parnell gives the transfer date as 30 Mar 45. On the 6 Jun 45 inventory report the two aircraft are back on Part I, indicating that they had returned to Harrington.

As soon as my pile diminishes, it builds up again. For the time being, I am doing no more than marking time!

I may have asked you this before and if so, please forgive me: have you any more pages from the F/C Logs for AAF Station 179, "Watch Log" than those that I have for the end of 25 Apr, 26 Apr and the beginning of 27
